Indiana District of Kiwanis & Riley Hospital for Children: Highlights of a steadfast history of service

- 1919 Kiwanis joined the statewide fundraising effort for Indiana's first children's hospital
- 1924 Riley Hospital for Children doors open, treating 1,200 children in the first year
- 1926 Just two years later, Indiana Kiwanis raised over \$200,000 for the 50 bed Kiwanis K-Wing
- 1958 Kiwanis Diagnostic & Outpatient Center opens
- 1970 \$125,000 donated to finance & equip the Rehabilitation Medical Facility
- 1980's Over \$500,000 raised for the Trauma Life Center through the Pan Am Games Torch Run
- 1994 KIDS for Riley Committee formed (Kiwanis In Direct Support for Riley)
- 1996 Funded one of several Kiwanis Mobile Intensive Care Transport Units (MICU)
- 1999 Pledged \$500,000 for a helipad located on top of the Riley Outpatient Center
- 2002 Raised \$500,000 for a Riley Surgical Unit
- 2008 Nearly \$1 million raised in four years for a Family Patient Room & Play Room in the Simon Family Tower
- 2009 Pledged \$1 million over four years for "Path to a Cure" Campaign for Diabetes Research
- 2013 Began a two-year campaign to raise \$450,000 for the Child Life Department at Riley
- 2015 Embarked on a four-year, \$1 million "3 Wishes: Early Action for Autism" Campaign
- 2019- Began a four-year, \$1 million "Delivering Hope and Health" Campaign

- Improved infant survival rates
- Statewide education about safe sleep practices

WHAT IS THE KIWANIS CAMPAIGN PROVIDING?

- Have established a Maternal Fetal Medicine Endowment that continues to grow. Helps care for moms and babies across the state
- Addresses a critical shortage of Maternal Fetal Medicine Specialists in the state. Riley has recruited 11 specialists and a team of caregivers
- Specialists offer training, education and support to hospitals and clinics across the state





Why is MFM Important?

- An increase of 5 MFMs per 10,000 births lowers the maternal mortality risk by 27%
- Babies with serious birth defects have better outcomes if they are delivered in the appropriate level of care
- Indiana has a high infant mortality rate – have improved but has a way to go
- Can develop a prognosis and prepare families with a plan prior to birth

Riley Maternity Tower Now Open

A maternity tower to care for low-risk to highly complex pregnancies—mother and baby are under one roof

Ja'Khari was eating and taking a nap in the NICU section of the tower. He arrived there Sunday during the move over to the new tower from IU Health Methodist Hospital. He's been getting lots of rest and is continuing to eat well and increase his weight. When he was born on Nov. 5th he weighed 3lbs. 2oz, today he is a content baby who rarely cries and enjoys being bundled up in his "baby burrito" blanket.

Success and Stories



Child and mother recently seen in the Fetal Center Clinic. MFM, Neonatalogist and radiologist met with mom after noticing fetal abnormality. Staff were looking at the fetal condition and organs but also the amount of amniotic fluid and where the organs attached. Noticed a defect in the diaphragm and diagnosed congenital diaphragmatic hernia where the lungs are "squished" together. It can compromise not only the lungs, but also the heart. Set a plan for delivery including if they needed clamps on the lungs or to breathe for the patient and a plan to fix the hold in the diaphragm with surgery. The delivery went well and the child and mom are both doing great now!

- 206 babies were delivered at Riley Hospital in November (11/7-11/30).
- 7 OBICU admissions providing high-level care to mothers.
- Team handles 13,000 patients in a year
- Seeing a record volume of patients in the Fetal Center and receiving a record number of referrals
- Families can be together within just a few hours even when their infant is critically ill







Team includes 11 MFM's, 2 fetal coordinators, 3 perinatal ambassadors, neonatologists and dozens of nurses In early November 2021, a dozen moms, 31 babies and 500 volunteers made a big transition. They moved into the new 116-bed Riley Hospital for Children Maternity Tower.

Riley Hospital for Children has the largest NICU in the state and one of only 2 Level 1V NICU's.
